#### From the Chaplain





## **Transportation SHSM Field Trip**

Denis Morris Students enrolled in Transportation Technology SHSM program traveled to eastern Pennsylvania to experience a wide variety of transportation based activities over 4 days.

Our first stop was the Watkins Glen International, nicknamed "The Glen", is an automobile race track in Finger Lakes region of New York. To our surprise there was a car club making laps around the track these included Porches, Ferraris', McLarens, Mustangs, and Camaros. This track has a rich history which includes hosting a yearly NASCAR race and previously F1 up to the 1980's.



On the second day we first visited the Antique Automobile Club of America (AACA) Museum in Hershey, PA which is dedicated to the preservation and education of motor vehicle history. One of the highlights of the AACA museum was the display of world's largest collection of the infamous Tucker Car Company.

Students also had the opportunity to take a factory tour of the New Holland Haytools Plant in York, PA. This was an up close tour of the manufacturing of agricultural equipment. The whole process was very interesting indeed! Our trip continued to the Railroad Museum of Pennsylvania. Many of the Museum's nearly 100 locomotives and railroad cars are housed inside a vast, 100,000-square-foot exhibit hall, with additional equipment stored outside in our Train Yard. The students we amazed by the overall size of these trains.

## **Transportation SHSM Field Trip... Continued**



The highlight of the trip was the NHRA Nationals in Reading, PA. This event incorporates NHRA's (National Hot Rod Association) Youth and Education Services (Y.E.S.) program. The Y.E.S. program was created as a tool to connect education and drag racing. Students attended a career day presentation that includes a panel discussion with Nitro Funny Car driver Bob Tasca, NHRA officials, and MAC Tools personnel. The students learn the importance of goal setting, career opportunities in motorsports and furthering their education. After the presentation our students were able to explore the sport of professional drag racing in which most had never experienced the thrill of 11,000 horsepower vehicle that can reach a speed of over 500 kilometres per hour in 1000 feet.



Our final stop was to the famous half mile dirt race track, Williams Grove Speedway. The race cars in attendance were the Hooiser Diamond Series 410 sprints and the 358 sprints. The dirt was flying!!

Overall the students were exhilarated with the whole experience of the Transportation Technology SHSM field trip.






This year, the Denis Morris English Department introduced ENG3C and ENG3U Understanding Contemporary First Nations, Métis, and Inuit Voices to the curriculum as per the Ontario Ministry of Education. In this course, students explore the themes, forms, and stylistic elements of a variety of literary, informational, graphic, oral, cultural, and media texts emerging from First Nations, Métis, and Inuit cultures. This is done through a series of Canadian Indigenous authors/creators from various periods and cultures including Drew Hayden Taylor, George Riga, and Waubgushig Rice. As well as view documentaries like We Were Children, The Reel Injun, and take part in cultural activities like beading, saging, and local festivals. Destreamed English (ENG1W) has successfully launched at Denis Morris. Taking an extra year before streaming students will allow them the opportunity to ensure they make the best decisions for their future. As well, students are able to learn and grow with their school age peers in the same classroom. Students have an opportunity to choose their stream in grade 10.

#### MATHEMATICS DEPARTMENT



The Math department and the math students have been very busy this semester whether it was preparing peer tutoring, working in study groups, participating in class activities or studying for final exams.

The grade 9's were busy preparing to write the EQAO math test, which was completed at the end of January by over 100 students. Senior students have been working all semester peer tutoring math after school at the homework help program.

Math students, more than ever, have been actively engaged in activities and lessons using technology whether it was using Knowledehook, MathUp, Desmos or finance calculators.

Of course, much of the end of January was spent preparing for final exams or summative assignments within their classes. We look forward to February when students will partake in the University of Waterloo math contests being written for grades 9 to 11 and in April for grade 12.





### **World Religions Trip**



Students in the Grade 11 World Religion courses this semester were treated to a field trip to begin the month of December. The annual World Religion trip is a great opportunity to live out the Vatican call for ecumenism.

Students began their day with a visit to the Congregation B'nai Israel and Jewish Community Centre where they learned about the history of the building and the ways that the Conservative community has changed over time. Students were invited to read from prayer books and even got to see the Torah Scrolls up close.

Next, they headed to the Al Noor Masjid (Islamic Society of St. Catharines) where they participated in a question and answer period to learn about the Five Pillars of Islam. Students were impressed with the beautiful, rich carpet that covered the floor and indicated the direction of Mecca. While at the place of worship they learned about the times of prayer throughout the day and how diverse the Muslim population is around the world.

From there, it was on to Saints Cyril & Methodius Ukrainian Catholic Church. Once inside students were in awe of the stunning iconography that adorns the walls. They discussed

the differences between the Roman Catholic and Ukrainian Catholic Church and even were allowed to step inside the sanctuary.

After a lunch break, students continued their day with a stop at the Niagara Regional Native Center. While there, students experienced a smudging ceremony and enjoyed the talented singing and drumming by our hosts. The day was a wonderful opportunity for students to compliment the curriculum from the classroom meeting people from each different spiritual tradition.

The entire experience spurred many conversations about the similarities and differences between the Roman Catholic faith and other spiritual practices.

#### **Activities in the Department**

It has been a busy time in the religion department this semester. Students participated in reconciliation preparation with Chaplain Patricia and then reconciliation with Father Greg of St. Julia's church. Furthering their faith, Chaplain Patricia took students to the "When Faith Meets Pedagogy Youth Forum" to hear from Fr. Tony. The Grade 9s and 12s each had separate retreat days at Heartland Forest.

Meanwhile, in classrooms, students had opportunities for hands on experiences. In Mrs. Einhorn's class students created rope rosaries in homage to Our Lady Undoer of Knots. In Mrs. Clark's grade 11 class, the world religion students made models of Jewish symbols or significant places and posters challenging stereotypes about Islam. Meanwhile in Mrs. Bitondo's classroom the Grade 12 students created painting depicting the Catholic Social Teachings and they now adorn our hallways.

Throughout the department and the school, students also made their presence felt as symbols of love and justice with works of service. Over the course of the semester, students collected pop tabs for St. Julia's CWL and food for our Christmas food drive. They also completed hundreds of hours of community service in our local churches and charities.

Possibly our most famous act of service is found in the pilgrimage. The

event started off with introductory assemblies. Former NCDSB chaplain Kelly Stephen brought stories of his own visits to our sister schools in Haiti to encourage students to get involved. And get involved they did. Students raised money and walked in solidarity with those less fortunate while calling to mind the Preferential Option for the poor. The pilgrimage day ended with school wide attendance at our home football game. At an event like pilgrimage it is easy to see how Denis Morris is a family and that family takes care of our brothers and sisters all over the world.



### **RELIGION DEPARTMENT**



The Religion Department of Denis Morris was lucky to have a number of guest speakers visit this fall. Twice this semester, the Denis Morris Religion department welcomed the Sisters of Our Lady Immaculate to speak to religion and careers classes. The first visit early in the semester focused on the vocations. The visiting Sisters spoke about their own experiences on he way to becoming a nun and welcomed questions from the audience. On their second visit in December the Soli Sisters talked about Advent. Again, students were fully engaged and peppered the sisters with questions about their daily lives and how they knew that the vocation was right for them. We are lucky to have a close relationship with the Sisters of Our Lady Immaculate.

The department also welcomed Adam Brule of the YMCA Youth Gambling Awareness Program to speak to students in Grades 9, 10 and 12. Mr. Brule

brought a wealth of knowledge on the impact of gambling on mental health. Through the program, students were made aware of the dangers of online gambling and stereotypes regarding mental health. They were also given strategies to deal with gambling and gaming. In all, over 100 students were able to participate in these workshops with the YMCA program.

Finally, the Grade 12 College and University level students welcomed Jessica Wang from the Niagara Region Sexual Assault Center to discuss the prevalence of Human Trafficking in the area. Students were surprised to learn the statistics surrounding this important issue. They were also given strategies to keep themselves safe both here in the Niagara Region and for future experiences at College and University. The religion curriculum at Denis Morris is diverse and comprehensive and tackles current issues facing our students in the light and understanding of our Catholic Faith.

All of these activities were part of a very successful Open House. Future Reds also had the opportunity to make and launch rockets during their visit to the school in November.





Within the Student Services Department at Denis Morris Catholic High School, you will find our Guidance Counsellors, Special Education/ Resource Teachers, Educational Assistants, Success Program, including our Success Teacher, Cooperative Education Teacher, and our Child and Youth Worker. The following is our staff list as well as their responsibilities and contact information.

#### **Co-operative Education**

Do you know what career path you are interested in? If you answered yes or no, how would you like to test drive your future career? You can do that through Cooperative Education! It provides students with a wide range of learning opportunities in a safe, culturally responsive environments in our community, outside of school. This program allows students to earn credits while completing both related curriculum along with gaining valuable skills through experiential learning. A student can earn two or four credits depending on their schedule and type of placement.

Cooperative Education allows students to participate in meaningful learning experiences that help prepare them for the next stage of their lives, whether in apprenticeship training, college, community living, university or the workplace. Also, Cooperative Education is an essential component of the Specialist High Skills Major requirements for any of the sectors available at our school. Some Cooperative Education placements in our community include: hospitality and tourism, automotive, construction/cabinet making, education, hairstyling and healthcare, to name a few.

If you are interested in learning more about Cooperative Education or becoming a Specialist High Skills Major, please see Mrs. Matijevic in Student Services.

#### **Child & Youth Worker - Mental Health**

As your Child and Youth Worker, I offer triage services that will benefit both the students and staff at DM. I offer contact information to services within the Denis Morris and Niagara Catholic District School Board services, such as Social Worker contact. As well I can provide contact information for Niagara Region Agencies and for professional and community connections. I work together with our school's Administration Team and the School Success Team to ensure every Denis Morris Catholic High School student can have a successful school year.

Should students needing social emotional assistance, a day of problem solving, coping strategies or simply need a quiet space to recharge and regroup, they can see me to chat. I am located in our school library. If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to contact me at extension 2322.

#### **Course Selection Process 2024-25**

Grade 9 - 11 students will be selecting their courses online again this year using myBlueprint. Course selection will take place using the myBlueprint high school planner feature. This can be accessed through the NCVLE at www.niagaracatholic.ca under the 'Students' tab on the homepage. All of our students have been shown how to do this.

The course selection process will take place during February 5th-22nd. All period one classes will be visited by a Student Services Counsellor during the week of February 5th-9th and given information on course selection. To complete the course selection process students are also required to pay the \$55 Activity Fee using School Cash Online.

Students wishing to return for Grade 12B (additional year or semester after graduation) should make an appointment with a Guidance Counsellor to register for courses for next year ASAP as courses will fill up quickly.

#### Grade 12 Potential Graduates

We have completed our individual Exit Plan Interviews with all our grade 12 students to help them make plans for life beyond Denis Morris. Each grade 12 student has been given a copy of his/her transcript information (September) in order to assist them with post-secondary planning and to ensure they are meeting graduation requirements. We have a Grade 12 Grad NCVLE class set up where numerous virtual links and scholarship opportunities are posted for students to access.

#### **University / College Application Process**

In October, we presented information on the online application process for Colleges and Universities in Ontario. All Grade 12's were invited to the DM Alumni Theatre for the presentation and step-by-step instructions for the application process were distributed.

In November we also held an evening for parents to come to learn more about the application process.

## **SHSM - Specialist High Skills Major**

Specialist High Skills Majors let students focus on a career path that matches their skills and interests while meeting the requirements of the Ontario Secondary School Diploma. Students receive the SHSM seal on their diploma when they: complete a specific bundle of 8-10 courses in the student's selected field; earn valuable industry certifications including first aid and CPR qualifications; gain important skills on the job through cooperative education placements.

SHSM's are for those Grade 11 and 12 students who are: heading for apprenticeship training, college, university or the workplace; wanting to identify, explore and refine their career goals and make informed choices about their next steps after secondary school. Students taking a SHSM, have the opportunity to: gain important skills on the job with actual employers, at skills training centers and at school; earn valuable industry certifications such as: First Aid, CPR and WHMIS qualifications.

#### **Denis Morris currently has 11 SHSMs**

Aviation, Arts and Culture, Business, Construction, Health and Wellness, Hospitality and Tourism, Horticulture and Landscaping, Information and Communication Technology, Justice/Community Safety and Emergency Services, Manufacturing and Transportation.
