Faith continues to live at Denis Morris! As a Catholic School Community, we pride ourselves on making faith a priority in all that we do. As a school rooted in Faith, we ensure that our priorities are focused on nurturing the body, mind and soul of our students as we develop leaders of tomorrow who are formed in faith. One of the highlights of our year is our Denis Morris Pilgrimage that has been a staple of Niagara Catholic for the past 49 years. This year, we had over 300 staff and students participate and raised over \$8000 to support our sister school in Haiti and Wells of Hope in Guatemala. By taking a 5km walk on the day of the Pilgrimage, we impact our Denis Morris community and the local community through our presence and we share the why of our Catholic faith as we express solidarity with those most in need.

Another yearly highlight are the Grade 9 and Grade 12 retreats. This year, the grade 9s attended Balls Falls for their retreats while the Grade 12s were able to attend Heartland Forest. In a combination of spiritual, social and physical components, participants on the retreats were able to have a great experience meeting new friends and further developing their knowledge of their faith. We know that this


Feeder School Day




Ontaro Secondary School Literacy Test - OSSLT




The OSSLT was a success with 80.5% of grade ten students achieving success on the first writing.

MATHEMATICS DEPARTMENT



The Math department and the math students have been very active during the first semester of the school year 2024-2025.

Students were preparing for math contests, working in study groups, participating in class activities and studying for final exams. We also had a Mathletes team again, comprised of students who have an interest in solving math problems in a team competition format. The team participated in a board wide Mathletes competition in the fall. This semester we also had a group of grade 12 students participate in the Canadian Senior Mathematics Competition put on by the University of Waterloo. The grade 9's were busy preparing to write the EQAO math test, which was completed at the end of January.

Students have been working all semester peer tutoring math after school at the homework help program held in the library and have been actively engaged in classroom activities all year long in their math courses.





World Religions Trip



Grade 11 religion students had the pleasure of attending the World Religion trip this November. Students under the care of Mrs. Shannon, Mrs. Ostaszewiczand Mrs. Clark travelled to the Congregation B'nai Israel and Jewish Community Centre, the Masjid An Noor and the Cham Sham Buddhist Temple. At each location the students were treated to guest lectures by members of the religious community. They had the

opportunity to see and touch religious artifacts and learn about the history of each place of worship within the Niagara Region. The trip was attended by almost 100 students and staff. This example of experiential learning is so valuable to students in grade eleven. The trip itself supports the Catholic Social Teaching of Solidarity and fulfills the Vatican's call for interreligious dialogue.

Grade 8 Day and Open House



We are excited to share the highlights of our recent Grade 9 Open House. It was a fantastic evening filled with engaging activities and demonstrations that showcased the incredible work our students have been doing in their science classes. Here are some of the exciting activities that took place:

Our visitors were thrilled by the Van de Graaff generator demonstration. This fascinating device, which generates static electricity, allowed students and guests to experience the wonders of electrostatics firsthand. Hair-raising fun was had by all as they learned about the principles of electric charge and static electricity.

In the biology lab, students demonstrated their skills and knowledge through a rat dissection. This hands-on activity provided an in-depth look at mammalian anatomy, helping students understand the complex structures and systems that make up living organisms. It was an eye-opening experience that highlighted the importance of anatomy in the study of life sciences.

Our budding electricians showcased their understanding of electric circuits. Through various interactive setups, they demonstrated how circuits work, the role of different components, and the principles of electricity. Visitors had the chance to build their own simple circuits and see the practical applications of what our students have been learning.

One of the most popular demonstrations was the "elephant toothpaste" experiment. This exciting chemical reaction, which produces a large foamy substance, captivated the audience. Students explained the science behind the reaction, including the role of catalysts and the decomposition of hydrogen peroxide. It was a fun and educational way to explore chemistry.

In the physics section, students used a sound cannon to demonstrate the properties of sound waves. By visualizing sound waves and their effects, they helped visitors understand concepts such as frequency, amplitude, and wave propagation. The interactive nature of this demonstration made it a hit with both students and parents.

We are incredibly proud of our Grade 9 students for their hard work and enthusiasm in preparing for the Open House. Chemistry & Physics

As we approach the end of the semester, we are thrilled to share some of the incredible projects and experiments our Science students have been working on. This semester has been packed with hands-on learning experiences that have brought science to life in our classrooms.


Our budding engineers in grade 11 Physics have been hard at work designing and building rockets. This project not only sparked their creativity but also provided a practical application of Newton's Laws of Motion. Students learned how these fundamental principles govern the movement of their rockets, from launch to landing. The excitement was palpable as each team tested their designs and made adjustments to achieve the perfect flight.



In our grade 10 Science class, students had the opportunity to dissect sheep's eyes. This hands-on activity allowed them to explore the anatomy of the eye and understand how light is processed to create vision. By examining the lens, retina, and other structures, students gained a deeper appreciation for the complexity of our visual system and the science behind optics.



The grade 12 chemistry lab has been buzzing with activity as students conducted calorimetry experiments. By measuring the heat of chemical reactions, they learned about energy transfer and the principles of thermodynamics. This lab not only reinforced their theoretical knowledge but also honed their skills in precise measurement and data analysis.



In grade 9, our exploration of space has taken students on a journey through the cosmos. Students who did not take a Grad Photo or students who would like to retake their photo are welcome to book an appointment online once the link is opened. We encourage all students to continue to check their gradespecific Student Services NCVLE for pertinent academic information, volunteer opportunities, and other important information. Student Services intends that this portal be the first stop for all students to receive information.

Course Selection

We began our in-class course selection presentations for the 2025-2026 Academic Year with our grade 9 students during the second week of January. We will continue with our grade10 and 11 students during the week of February 10-13 during period 1. We strongly recommend that students speak to their teachers, parents/guardians, family members, and family friends to help guide them in their choice of courses and levels and ultimately, their post-secondary aspirations. The deadline to select courses through MyBlueprint is February 27 in addition to the \$55 activity fee payment through SchoolCashOnline.

Co-operative Education provides students with a wide range of hands-on learning opportunities in the workplace with one of our community partners. This program allows students to earn credits while gaining valuable employability skills through experiential learning. A student can earn two or four credits depending if it is a full-day or half-day co-op.



The DM Co-operative Education program is open to students in grade 11 and grade 12 and allows students to participate in meaningful placement learning experiences that help prepare students for the next stage of their lives, whether in apprenticeship, college, university, community living or the workplace. Co-operative Education is an essential component of the Specialist High Skills Major (SHSM) requirements for any of the sectors available at our school.
